Sir We have just received a Resolution of Congress of the 2d Instant recommending to the Governor and Council of this State to permit as much Bread, Flour and Wheat to be exported for the State of Virginia as the said State may want for its publick Supply. We have also received a Letter of the 5th Inst from Col: Lamb: Griffin requesting that there might be enclosed to you the necessary Powers for the Purpose, you being appointed Agent by the Board of War of Virginia. There does not appear to us to be any Thing further necessary to empower you to execute this Business, but to give Permission to the Particular Vessels to load the Bread and Flour which you may purchase for and send to Virginia, which we shall grant on being made acquainted with the Descriptions of the Vessels you employ, the Names of the Captains and what they are to load with and Bond and Security being given to deliver the Lading to the Board of War and produce a Certificate here of its having been done, the Dangers of the Voyage excepted.

In Council Annapolis 8th Oct^r. 1779.

Gent: Mr: Francis Lewis on the 27th Jan^r 1779. wrote the Governor from Baltimore that he was on a Visit to his Family then there, that as a Member of the Marine Board, he had been charged to inspect the fitting out some Continental Vessels, of which one was a new Vessel, fitting out for a Packet Boat, commanded by Thos: Read Esq^r, that she was pierced for 12 guns, 3 Pound^s & 11" and, as no such Cannon could be procured at Balt^r he was induced to apply to the Governor for 10 Pieces of Cannon for that Purpose &c, if the Cannon can be spared, please to let me know the Terms on Behalf of the State & upon the Receipt of your Answer, I shall return to Congress and repeat the same". We wrote him 11th Feb^r that we had six 3 Pound^s which belonged to the Defence, we believed very good & their carriages compleat, that the Congress might have them with their carriages for the Price such would sell for at Balt^r of which we presumed, he might be easily ascertained; that we had no other 3 Pound^s so that we could spare with convenience, that we had some guns made at Dorsey's Works for fours, but they carried a Shot of 5" and upwards, perhaps we could make out the Number with them, if we can, the Congress may have four of them, but that it was likely they were too heavy for the Purpose". Capt: Read afterwards passed us this Receipt "Received of the State of Maryland for the use of the Baltimore Packet belonging to Congress, two short three Pounds with their carriages which were sent to Baltimore by the Governor and Council and also four short three Pounds Apr^r 1778" Thos: Read". The six three Pound^s with their carriages first mentioned in the Rec^r had been sent to Balt^r inclosed of a Letter from the Marine Committee, dated York Town 8th March 78. in which the Committee agreed to the Terms proposed in our Letter to Mr: Lewis of the 17th Feb^r preceding; so that we had no Idea of our having any Thing further to do with the Guns. We received a Letter from Mess^r: Morris, Nesbit &c concerning nine of these guns, an Extract of which is inclosed, to us 31st Aug^r 1778, the Marine Committee, these Letters may easily be recurred to & the Bills of Sale must depend on the Contract between the Committee & those Gentlemen, for we have no claim to them, they belonged to the Congress.
