We would not have you do anything more to the Barracks at present but advise you to have the Hatchets taken out and secured to prevent any further damage to them. If you have any Clothing on Hand we wish you to forward it immediately to Mr. Hepple. We would have you purchase about three or four hundred Shirts, provided you can get it at the Price you mention, to supply the Recruits to be raised by the late Act.

It is necessary that the utmost expedition shall be used in transporting the Clothing, for our Quota of the Army of the United States to Camp and we do instruct you to procure in time, such a Number of Wagons as will be sufficient for that Purpose. You must attend the Wagons in Person and take such a Guard as you think necessary. When you arrive at Camp, you are to deliver the Clothing to Mr. John Randall State Doctor and take his Receipt for the same.

37. You are to apply to Mr. James Calhoun of Baltimore Town and request him to give you an Order on the Continental Quartermaster for Passage for the Horses

Sir.

This Board reposing Confidence in your Zeal and Activity to promote the Cause of Liberty, have appointed you one of the Recruiting Officers for — County and have to observe by Way of Instructions, that you must, in discharging your Duty, pursue the Directions contained in the "Act for recruiting the Quota of Troops of this State in the American Army", herewith sent. For the Subsistence of the Recruits enlisted by you, we advise you to purchase Provisions sufficient for that Purpose and to allow each Recruit the continental Rations.

To enable you to make such Purchase and to pay the Continental and State Bounties, we have sent you an Order on the Collector of the Tax for your County for three thousand Dollars. You must render us an Account of the Money expended in the Purchase of Provisions to subsist your Recruits and in paying the Bounties and inform when more Money will be necessary for this Service. Should there be a Recruiting Officer in your County from Camp, you must deliver your Recruits to such Officer, as soon as you can, after they are passed, if not, you must deliver them to the Recruiting Officer in any other County that is most convenient. Should there be an Army Commissary in your County, and convenient, it will be proper to draw the Rations for your Recruits from him. You are to use every precaution to avoid enlisting British or foreign Deserters; the most particular Attention to this Object of your Instructions will be necessary to prevent Imposition.
