Sir,

Confiding in your patriotic zeal and activity, we have appointed you in conjunction with

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to assist in carrying into Execution the enclosed Act to prohibit the Exportation of Indian Corn &c. a great Scarcity of the articles enumerated in the Act will be created, Prices will be enhanced and the Difficulties of obtaining Supplies for the Army will be augmented. If every Precaution is not made and the utmost Vigilance used to prevent a Removal of these articles out of the State by designing and enterprising Persons whose Possession of Grain may induce them to attempt an Evasion of the said Act at every Hazard. We are too well acquainted with your attachment to your Country, its Liberties and Independence to suppose the above Successions are by any Means necessary to stimulate you to give the greatest Attention to this Business, but we thought it our Duty to disclose what has occurred to us relative to this Subject. When you stop any of the articles enumerated in the said Act which is about to be carried or removed out of the State. You are to give Information of it to a Magistrate and cause it to be deposited in such Place as he shall appoint. You will take Care to let us know frequently what you do under the said Act.
