Sir, When the Treasury of Maryland will admit of it, you may depend on our depositing such Sum of Money in the Hands of one of the Delegates of our State in Congress, as you may engage to pay in Philadelphia in Virtue and by Authority of the Resolution of the Honorable General Assembly of the 1st of December last without putting the Holders of Certificates to the Trouble and Expence of sending hither for their Money. We hope this Assurance will have the Effect you expect, of obviating every Difficulty which has occurred in carrying the said Resolution into Execution, as we esteem it a Measure very necessary.
