136 Sir, It is the Opinion of this Board that the Flour saved from the Vessels lately shipped for the Havanna, and now sent to Baltimore more under your Direction should be examined, and what appears by any means damaged, you are to have mixed with course Flour, which you are to purchase for that Purpose and have baked into Bread proper for the ~~service~~ Army, and barreled; and that which is good we would have repacked in a Manner you think best; the whole to remain for the further Directions of this Board, you will inform us of the Condition of this Flour and your Procedure thereon.
