Sir, It is the opinion of this Board that the Flour saved from
at 156. the Vessels lately shipped for the Havanna, and now sent to Baltimore
more under your Direction should be examined, and what appears
by any means damaged, you are to have mixed with some Flour,
which you are to purchase for that Purpose and have baked into
Bread proper for the subsistence Army, and barreled; and that
which is good we would have repacked in a manner you
think best; the whole to remain for the further Directions
of this Board, you will inform us of the condition of this
Flour and your procedure thereon.

the Bay, where we propose to send her to bring up the residue
of that State Flour, we request you will be so obliging to
