

General Orders in that of the 8<sup>th</sup>  
Governor Jefferson,

In Council, 16<sup>th</sup> March, 1781.

Sir, We are informed by his Excellency, Governor Jefferson, that the  
No 260 Convention Troops, and those taken at the Convents were at Winchester  
on the 12<sup>th</sup> Instant on their March to Lancaster; agreeable to an  
Order of Congress of the 3<sup>d</sup> Instant, as we apprehend these Troops are  
by this Time at Knowlton's Ferry, the Point from whence they are  
to be under the Direction of this State, and must proceed in a  
few Days; we think it necessary to communicate these circumstances  
to your Excellency, that Measures may be adopted to supply them  
with Provisions as soon as they arrive in Pennsylvania. We are so  
circumscribed by the Quantity of Provision furnished the  
Detachment under the Marquis that it will be with Difficulty  
we can furnish them to your Baders. The Prisoners from this  
State ordered to York Town will also proceed in a few Days, about  
eight hundred British the Number from Virginia we cannot  
ascertain. If the Executive of your State should fix on any  
other Places than now assigned by Congress for their reception,  
we request your Excellency to give us the earliest Information  
thereof with the necessary Communication respecting Supplies  
His Excellency Joseph Reed Esq.)

In Council 17 March, 1781.

Sir, We have so little Provision and the Conveyance fit to you so  
261 difficult that we think you had better in the Neighbourhoods  
and assign to each Guard one Pound Salt or one pound and a  
Quarter fresh meat and one Pound and a Quarter Flour p Day  
you must procure the Provision on the best Terms you can.

In Council, 17 March, 1781.

Sir, We have your letter of the 16<sup>th</sup> by Express. The English  
Ships are now at anchor off this place while they continue here  
it will be improper to send any Vessels down the Bay.
