

wherefore you will without Delay send off all the Galleys, you have on the Hoop roads
to this place; and your full Provisions by Water up Patapscot to afford Materials to the
10. 309. Law of Mr. John Smith Brooks. we wrote to you some Time since with Vaneah to
procure a Quantity of Fresh Provisions, this you must continue and increase the quan-
tity to twenty thousand weight with you almost, Vigilance. The Directions for
removing the Salt Provisions were given from an apprehension they might be in Danger
from the Enemy, but if they are in place of Safety it will be for ^{them} unnecessary to remove.

In Council, 4th April, 1781.

Sir, The Commissions requested by yours of the 25th ult. we herewith send you.
The Laws are not printed, therefore it is not in our power to lend them. You are
Commissioner of the County to supply what Provisions you stand in need of for
the Militia called into Service; but in all Probability each man will not be on
Duty more than a Day or two, at a time, and if they would furnish themselves with
as much Provision as would suffice them for the time they are in Service,
they make hereafter make a Return to the State, which shall be repaid. As
the Mode of Defense, that will rest with you who are on the Spot, and not
with at this place; Mr. Donnellan is appointed to recruit from Batties
and Harford Counties. In Answer to yours of the 2^d instant, we can only say
it certainly is your Duty to be prepared against any attempt the Enemy may
think proper to make. We presume you have the proportion of arms and other
contrivances for your County; Artillery we can not supply, ^{you} with which you are to
apply to Mr. Coghour who will supply you with Salt. It is indispensably
necessary that the Blown should be removed to a Place of the utmost Security
we conceive Property of such public utility, and value in such imminent
Danger as you make mention of should not be delayed a moment from a
removal, which we desire you will do as soon as you possibly can and hope
in Justice you may not wait the Directions of this Board in like cases. we
confer to suspend the Draught in Harford until 1st Day of May.
