Sir, We wrote you on the third Instant to furnish Col. Woods with
such Numbers of the Militia of your County as he may think necessary
to go with the Militia indeed from Frederick Town to guard the Con-

the Charge of them whilst at Fort Frederick which we hope and
expect he will, we request you to order on Duty so many of the
Militia as he may request to act as a Guard over them which
Militia shall be relieved on Application by you to this Board by
other Militia when their Tour of Duty is done.
