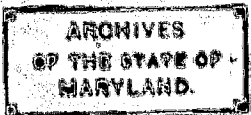


389. In Council, 20th April, 1781.

Sir, Walter Pigoth who was executed by Order of the Marquis among other
Things gave Information that a certain Joshua Dorey a resident of Baltimore
Town was on Board the enemies Ships whilst they lay opposite this Harbour,
we enclosed now a warrant to apprehend him, and seize all his Papers.
If he has removed to any other Part of this State and you can give Informa-
tion to the Lieutenant or any other Person to find him you will be
so kind to have it done, if apprehended to cause him with his Papers
to be sent under a sufficient Guard to this City for Examination.

391. In Council, 22^d April, 1781.

immediately on our being furnished with the Information required in

Sir, You will furnish Col Muddock with what Provisions you ^{may} have
or may get; The Prisoners and Guard at District Town are without
such Provisions of any kind. You will make every ^{possible} ^{use} of your Power
to keep them supplied, as we wish to avoid every just Ground of Complaint.
