543 Sir, We have received yours of the 7th Instant, and think it
would be proper for you to supply the Militia with fresh Provisions
and to preserve the Salt Provisions as long as you possibly can,
which may be made use of in the Heat of Summer when fresh
Provisions will not answer. We have enclosed an Order on the
Collector for 15000 Pounds of Tobacco. The Assembly have not
taken any Order respecting the Tobacco in your Hands but
in St. Mary's Warehouse, when they do, your Account may
be finally settled, we wrote you on the 9th Instant and are
apprehensive, did not enclose the Law mentioned to be
enclosed, and therefore now send you it, we do not think it
proper that more Barrels should be made up in your County
than may be necessary for the Post.
