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considerable sum of ^{his own} Money, in procuring and furnishing the titles,
and that he will be put to great inconvenience unless he is paid. we are
 exceedingly disturbed by the Applications and Complaints of the Creditors of this
 State, and greatly embarrassed by the Resolution of the 3^d Instant, and the
 Act to adjust the Debts due from this State. The Act directs that all claims
 against the State, for Debts or Contracts since the 1st Day of December
 seventeen hundred and forty seven shall be reduced to Specie, according
 to the true Value, observing the Rule prescribed, and that a Certificate
 shall be given by the Treasurer, on our Order, for that sum in Specie,
 but does not direct, that when the Contract is in Specie that a certificate
 shall be given for the amount, to be discharged in the same Manner
 and when Certificates given on Contracts for paper Money or Produce
 seized &c are to be paid, which makes the Persons who has contracted in
 Specie insist that he ought ^{to be} paid Specie or an Equivalent in Tobacco
 or Flour. With Discrepancy we presume it was not the intention of the Legislature
 to make any distinction between Debts and Contracts in Paper or Produce,
 and Debts and Contracts in Specie as to the Time and Manner of Payment,
 because it appears to be inequitable and would create much dissatisfaction
 and uneasiness among those who have been unfortunate as to contract
 in Paper, and be a means of giving the People a greater Disgust to
 paper Money, and restraining them from contracting in it in Future.
 we wish for the sake of the public Interest and to avoid the future
 of the people (some of whom being unacquainted with our Resources
 and others from different Motives, impute every Failure in the Exec-
 utive to causes very different from those which actuate their con-
 duct) for the Direction of the General Assembly whether any prefer-
 ence is to be given to Specie Contracts? whether the public Tobacco and
 Tobacco are to be made use of to satisfy the certificates to be given under the
 Act? whether the Money in the Treasury and to be collected is to be so applied
 and at what rate? If it is the Opinion of the general Assembly that the
 Tobacco, Flour, and Money should be thus appropriated, whether it would
 not be consistent with Justice and good Policy, that the Auditor should
 make an estimate of the public Property, and each Creditor paid in
 Proportion to his Demand? for if they are paid as they apply till their
 whole is exhausted those only who are most convenient will be paid
 and the rest much dissatisfied and full of Complaints, and alarm.

Great Assembly
