the Fleet militia and the Horses from Frederick which we have
heard are on their March, that we have made to the Lieutenant
directing him to discharge them immediately.

Sir, The Intelligence received for some Days and this Morning
induces us to think that the Enemy have ~~acted~~ declined to make
the attack on this State, which their Behaviour and Movements
indicated, and of which we apprized you we therefore think it un-
necessary that the Fleet militia and Horses of your County should march
or continue any longer in Service, and request you to discharge them
immediately, enjoining them at the same time to be prepared at
all points to march to any Part of the State to repel any Invasion
particular, Lieuts. of Washington, Montgomery, Prince Georges Counties
with this Addition to the Lieutenant of Frederick; You is of the
16th instant we have just received, and have sent you by Cuttler
Rigginburg the Expences £ 750. which you will apply to the
Purchase of the 100 Saddles &c. we think them very reasonable
and hereby engage to indemnify Messrs. Drury, Holman, M'Nay
and Scholl against the Gentlemen with whom they have contracted
for the Saddles.
