Sir
We have received a Letter from His Excellency General Washington and another from General Lincoln of such great Importance and pressing Necessity that we think the common Good requires us immediately to transmit copies of them to your Honorable Board and to solicit your utmost Aid and Attention to procure and forward the Supplies which the Army appears to greatly want. Letters of Requisition in the strongest Terms have been written to the Commissioners General of both Shores, to collect the publick Flour and Wheat, and to grind up the Wheat without a Moment's Loss of Time, but we are very apprehensive that their collections will prove too slow and too small to answer the great Purposes necessary for the immediate Support of the Army. We have nothing to depend on to purchase with but the Money of the last Edition, but have strong Hopes that very considerable Quantities of Wheat and Flour may be procured from generous and publick spirited Individuals on Loan, to be repaid in Kind and with Interest if desired, out of the publick Taxes, in a few Months. The High Opinion we entertain of the Opulence and good Disposition of great Numbers of Gentlemen on the Eastern Shore, and the entire Reliance we have on the Efficacy of your Exertions and Applications, induce us to recommend this Buſineſſ the immediate Supply of Flour for the continental Army to your most serious Consideration, and we flatter ourselves, the Measures you adopt, whether by Purchase, by Loan or otherwise will be most effectual to answer the present exigency. If Wheat and Flour are purchased, Money shall be transmitted for immediate Payment and Certificates may be granted for all Loans bearing an Interest of 6% to be paid in Kind and we think if Vessels can be procured in your Rivers, the Flour, as fast as it can be collected in proper Quantities, should be sent to the Army in Virginia.
