We have ordered all the public Horses to be immediately sent to this Place, so that we cannot comply with your Requisition for the two at Frederick. We are sorry it is not in our Power to provide for Capt. Sackett, having determined not to mount any Horse.

07075 Sir We are forced with your Letter of yesterday, with the return of the same, and desire you to continue making to the West, Instantly, the same, and some Shovelheads. It appears to us that the Spades and Shovelheads are too small and that the Pick Axes, at one end of the Head, is too small. The Eye of the Axes are also too small, not being equal in breadth to the Head of the Spade.
