I have to inform you that I have written to Mr Chase
Chief Justice of this State and to Mr Hollingsworth Attorney of the United
States for the district of Maryland requesting them to pursue the necessary

to the Capture of the Ship Charles and Schooner Delight. Notice of the

Originals.
