

conciliatory Partion and that they should have for their inducement, the
actual Hostility or a dangerous commencement of measures inimical to the
Government, and that in every Instance the civil authority should be presented
to for countenance and support.

It is most desirable that the awe which an adequate force
is calculated to inspire, may produce Quiet and obedience, instead
of enforcing it by bloodshed. (But I have such confidence in your
discretion that I am satisfied observations of this kind are unnecessary
and that the detachment will be made to act only where it shall be
indispensable and that then it will be made to act with firmness
and effect.

A Plan will be formed for the subsistence and pay of the Troops
and communicated in proper time arms &c will be put into their hands
from the public Stores, and as there appears to be no lead in the Magazine
Cartridges will be forwarded from hence, not only for the Musquets, but
the ordnance with which the detachment will be furnished.

Annapolis September 13th 1794.

Sir,

I received last night the Presidents directions, for
marching the whole quota of Militia under orders to Williams Port.
Some alarming communications received from the upper parts of the State make
it doubly necessary that the Troops should be pushed on at least to Frederick
Town with all possible speed. As I do not suppose that you can have
taken measures for supplying them with rations on their march, I have
directed the Brigadiers and Field Officers to procure provisions in the
best manner they can and to give certificates therefor, which I have
told them will be paid at our Treasury, the State of which however
will not be competent to such disbursements. I have therefore requested
that you would transmit to this place a sum of money not less than
two thousand dollars to answer the above purpose and other expenses that
are momentarily occurring in this business.
