

and by that means to reimburse the State in the most advantageous manner for her loss.

We shall in our statement of the situation of the several armories of the State which will in a short time be prepared, give as particular an account as is possible of the loss incurred in these articles.

In order to comply with the Resolution respecting the repairs of the Magazine at Frederick Town we were under the necessity of requesting the agency of some gentleman on the spot and accordingly applied by letter to General Mountjoy Bayley who was so obliging as to offer all the assistance in his power. - We directed him to contract for the repairs in conformity to the Resolution and made him an advance of such a sum of money as we judged necessary.

We learn however that the repairs made are very inconsiderable and of course that but little of the money is expended. - The reason appears to be, that the Building is deemed unfit for the purpose and that repairing it would create an unnecessary expence. The communications which we have received from General Bayley and the armorer on this subject and our letters addressed to them will throw further light on this subject, but are of too great length to admit of being detailed within the bounds of a letter.

By a Resolution of the last session respecting a Judgment obtained by the State against Mr Eccleston, we were directed to appoint a person to be joined with the one chosen by him in order to ascertain the sum which he was to pay.
