

The General Government would have afforded to the Maryland State Guard a sufficient force
and have written several times to the Secretary at War requesting it. He informed them that
a Regiment of Regulars was to be assigned to Maryland when it could be raised. Late yesterday
heard nothing from him on that subject. We have also addressed a letter to the President
of the United States concerning our
dangerous situation and asking for assistance, but no answer has yet been received.

It is utterly impossible for the State Government to afford adequate protection to the State
against the Enemy and we yet hope that the General Government will give us some aid.
We wrote you in a former letter that it was out of our power to send to you Camp Equippage
to arm the Militia which by order of the President has been stationed at Annapolis and
about to be stationed in Baltimore require more of these articles, than the State has been
able to provide.

In Council Annapolis April 30. 1813

We are honored with your letter of the twenty fifth. We have been for some time par-
ticularly employed in sending Arms and Ammunition into the different parts of the State
exposed to the depredations of the Enemy. So many Sections of it requiring at this time
be supplied, it is utterly impracticable, with the limited means which we possess, to do more
as we could wish towards placing them in a proper state to resist aggression. Since the first of
March we have sent to Captain Pages Company Seventy two Stand of Arms fifty to
Captain Bicks Company one hundred and Thirty to Colonel Reed's Regiment and one hundred
we have ordered to be sent from Easton, to the order of General Chambers for the use of
Colonel Spencers. These we hope will be distributed amongst the Militia in the various
parts of the County most likely to be invaded, and trust that they will be sufficient to
