that five hundred and fifty Muskets have been received by this State from
the General Government. These Muskets were delivered in the Month
of March last, and are the only Muskets which have been received by
this State in virtue of the Act of Congress to which your Order refers.

Your letter of the last evening has been received. The unengaged Militia
until called into actual service by the United States cannot be subject to all
the duties which can be required of ordinary soldiers. It is thought merely
designates the individuals who upon the first demand of the United States
Government authority, are bound to serve and do whatever may be directed to remain
subject to their call. Until ordered into service, the recruits referred to the Com-
missioners, to which they originally belonged, are to be bound by the same dates and
