It is however undesirable, and in such a case, they would be released from the service of the State to enter into that of the United States. The Legislature is now engaged, in making some regulations, regard to the calling out of the Militia and so forth, but it is doubtful what will be done when necessary to order them into service, care should be taken, to avoid every unnecessary expense to the State. No more officers, should be kept in service than the men, who are really required.

In Council Annapolis May 28 1813

Repeated applications have been made to us for information relative to the power of Militia Officers, to force men into the service, men who when called upon refuse to obey a Bill to give this power to the Officers, has this Morning been rejected by the House of Delegates by an almost unanimous vote. It is necessary to observe, that all the power to be exercised by officers of the Militia must be derived from the laws under which they receive their appointments. However insufficient they may be found for such a crisis as the present, they can be increased only by the Legislature. We should be very sorry to learn that any attempt had forced men into service, more than according to the provisions of the Militia law, was made, or that in the attempt to protect the property of our citizens, any outrage had been committed upon them. It would be very difficult to determine the precise extent of power which might lawfully be vested in the officers of the Militia; as however the right of authorizing and commanding them in military cases, is derived from the same
