Boston June 15th 1813

Your two letters have been received. To call out the Militia in insurrection at  
such a distance from the place where they are to be called, and without any know-  
ledge of the force, which may at any time make the invasion or the which it will be  
in the power of our officers, to employ in repelling it. An Act of Assembly passed at  
the last session to provide for calling out detachments of the Militia, to repel invasion  
and so forth makes some alteration in the law. This law with others is expected to be pub-  
lished and as soon as can be had will be distributed. It provides among other things  
that the commanding Officers of Companies shall proceed immediately to divide  
their companies into lots from one to ten and when ordered into service, they shall  
begin with the first class, and secondly when a class is required, the commanding officer  
of the company shall notify them by writing three days before they are to assemble  
unless they are called into immediate service (when the order will so state) and any  
individual neglecting to serve in person or to offer a substitute (who is to be approved  
of by the commanding officer of a company) and unless excused by sickness or  
other reasonable excuse shall pay a fine not exceeding fifty Dollars current Money.  
In case of insurrection or invasion, the Officer calling out the Militia, shall give  
immediate information of it with every circumstance attending the same as early  
as possible, to his immediate commanding Officer by whom such information shall  
be transmitted with the utmost expedition to the Commandee in chief.
