Gentlemen

In Council December the 23 1813

In the course of the last Spring a number of the Militia of adjoining States volunteered their services for the defence of parts of Maryland threatened with attack, and they were engaged by our officers. When Their Pay Rolls were forwarded to this Department they were rejected because the law did not authorize their employment. As however many similar emergencies may occur the services of our fellow citizens of other states might be of essential benefit to us, the law of authorizing their acceptance, and an allowance to them of the pay and rations given to our own Militia, is submitted to the legislature.

In acting upon this subject the legislature will of course take into consideration the plan of directing payment to those who have already been in our service. Most of them were employed in Cecil County, at a time when the enemy was there in considerable force and the most forcible testimony has been borne to their good conduct. We trust the legislation will be so judicious as to satisfy all parties. The Honorable The General Assembly
