Dear Sir,

I have made out your account against the State for collecting arms &c. amounting to \_\_\_\_\_ and laid it before the Governor and Council for their examination together with a statement <sup>showing the manner in which</sup> of the sum that was appropriated by the General Assembly at December Session <sup>1814</sup> has been expended of that sum there only remains \$263.00 in hand. Mr. Pindell has likewise exhibited a claim for exceeding in amount the unexpended balance.

You will therefore be obliged to wait until the meeting of the Legislature for a settlement of your account. It is right and there will be no difficulty I should think in getting a Resolution passed authorising the payment of it. The Executive will however meet again on the 29<sup>th</sup> Inst. And if they can do any thing for you at that time it will give them pleasure to do so. They are highly satisfied with the manner in which you have executed the duties arising out of your Agency.
