There never was an account presented against a government or individual, that is more just than ours, or better supported by vouchers taking all circumstances into consideration.

(The vouchers filed at Washington to sustain our claims are in every instance equal to those that the Executive had before them, and in many instances better. The orders on the Treasury properly receipted, showing that the amount charged in the abstract has been paid, have been likewise filed.)
