We have it in our power to communicate to you the pleasing intelligence that we have this day received a letter from the second Comptroller of the United States Treasury informing us that the claim of the State for military expenditures during the late war, has been paid to the amount of ninety four thousand seven hundred and ten dollars and twenty one cents

Understanding that William Carpenter charged with having unlawfully received sundry Bank Notes of the goods and chattels of the President Directors and Company of the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, knowing them to be stolen, has not been delivered up to the Civil Authority of the State of Maryland, agreeably to my demand of the 29th day of June last; in consequence of some inadvertency on the part of your Excellency, and that he still resides in the State of Ohio; I have deemed it to be proper, to renew my application, and have accordingly to request that he be delivered up to Mr George F. Alberti Sumner, who has been appointed Agent on the part of the State of Maryland, to receive the said William Carpenter and remove him to this State. you will receive enclosed a copy of the Indictment
