Dear Sir,

I yesterday received yours of the 10th Inst and immediately again committed the same to the Council upon the subject. Having learned from them that according to their recollection no blanks for retailers of spirituous liquors or Dry Goods Licenses, had ever been furnished from this office, I turned to the Laws and have not found any provision requiring them to be so furnished.

It seems to me to be the duty of the Clerks to supply themselves with such licenses in the same manner that they obtain their writs &c for which they have a specified fee.
