

Council Chamber June 27 1825.

Dear Sir,

The death of Mr Richardson of which I presume you are apprised it appears to me makes it necessary that the Council should meet with as little delay as possible to supply his place as Treasurer of the Eastern Shore.

I have consulted Mr Hancock upon the subject and he thinks it very important indeed that the appointment should be speedily made, but knowing the great inconvenience of a meeting at this season of the year, and having no opportunity of seeing you soon, have declined naming any day until I receive your instructions, which I hope you will let me have by return mail. I shall write to the members of the Council today merely to apprise them of the loss of Mr Richardson and the consequent probability of a speedy call.

Sir,

By a communication from Capt & Nicholas Pades, it appears that he signed to give from the United States Arsenal near Baltimore in October last two hundred muskets and accoutrements in account of the States quota of arms under the act of Congress of 1808 providing for arming the whole body of the Militia.

I have not been able to discover in this department any acknowledgment from you of the receipt of said arms, and as it is necessary for us to acknowledge their receipt from the United States, will thank you to advise me as soon as convenient whether or not they come to your hands.
