I am instructed to inform you of the Resolution passed by the Legislature at the time of your relative settlement of the accounts of the Commission, limited under the Act of 1818, Chapter 200, to adjust and define the Western boundary line. You will perceive that the Resolution requires the Executive to make a detailed statement of the amount of expenditures, in carrying that Law into effect. The accounts of the other Commission, and all the other parts being adjusted, nothing now remains to enable the Executive to make a full and final report to the Legislature but a settlement with the representatives of the deceased Commission the late Thomas J. Smith. I enclose you an account of the money advanced and balances to request your attention to the subject so as to be prepared to make a settlement at the next meeting of the Executive which will be held on Thursday the 22nd Instant.
