By virtue of a Resolution passed at the last session of the General Assembly No 75, the Governor and Council have appointed you in conjunction with Thomas James Bullitt Esq, to revise digest and collate, all such public acts of Assembly of this State as are now in force and to perform the other duties prescribed by the said Resolution.

The high importance of the contemplated work, and the great benefit, which, if accomplished, it will confer on the people of Maryland, induced the Executive to select Gentlemen every way qualified to carry into complete effect the wise and laudable intention of the General Assembly, and whose distinguished reputation will impart confidence and authority to the result of their labours.

The compensation for the services and labours enjoined by the Resolution of the General Assembly has not been fixed; but is left at the discretion of the Executive, and will, no doubt, be liberal and duly proportioned to their nature and amount, and the value and importance of the work, when completed.
