William T. Hardee inquiring of the Governor that you wished directions from him relative to a Negro Slave whose punishment he lately commuted from death to transportation in law instructed by His Excellency to inform you that he considered you sufficient authority for the sale of the said Negro Slave for the benefit of the State. He is authorized to direct you to require security for the transportation of the Slave agreeably to the condition of his pardon, but he deems it unnecessary to do so. You saw, it is presumed, sell to some Southern purchaser, (the usual course in such cases), whose interest will be a sufficient security.
