I am instructed by the Executive today to say that it is with regret they have learned that you intend to retire from the station you now hold in the Militia of this State. As they feel convinced that your long service in the various commands which you have held in this War Service, have given you claims upon the feelings of the Community, which they are well assured it would be painful to dispense and as they feel an extremely reluctant at parting with their old and long tried Officer, they trust you will upon reconsideration, consent to favour your Country with a continuance of your services. Should you however persist in a determination to resign they shall be reluctantly constrained by duty to receive it; but a contrary course on your part, would be highly gratifying to them, and would, doubtless, be highly agreeable to all who are acquainted with your character and pretensions.

In answer to your letter of the 5th Instant, I am instructed to inform you that it is the opinion of the Executive that no Tobacco can be exported by Water from this State, except to the County of Washington in the District of Columbia, as provided for by Act of 1802 (Chapter 27) unless the same be inspected, and a Manifest thereof be produced to, and lodged with the Collector of the District, where the vessel may ride, by the Master of the vessel some time before her clearance.

The inspection laws of this State, according to their opinion, do not make any distinction in this particular between Tobacco of foreign growth and that which is the production of this State.
