To the President and Directors
of the Pennsylvania Institution
for the Education of Deaf and Dumb.

Gentlemen,

The General Assembly at its last Session passed an act providing for the education of the indigent Deaf and Dumb of this State in the Institution under your charge.

The act makes provision for admitting, annually, all the indigent Deaf and Dumb white persons of sound mind from twelve to twenty five years of age in their time and for the education of twenty of them. It authorizes the Governor to pay, by drafts on the Treasurer of the Western Shore to the President of the said Institution, one hundred and sixty dollars per annum for each pupil, who may be inscribed therein; one half to be paid at the expiration of six months, and the other half at the end of the year in which each pupil shall have been instructed.

Each person that may be deemed entitled, and be admitted to obtain the benefit of the said act, will be furnished with a certificate thereof to be handed over to you, at the time of their admission into the Institution.
