

year 1828. The quantity inspected in the State, out of the City of
Baltimore is very small, and estimated of so little consequence, that
no returns are required from the Inspectors.

Our laws do not provide for the inspection
of dried Fish. None caught in this State are cured and preserved
in that manner, and the quantity brought and consumed within
it is believed to be very limited.

The delay in answering your letter, has
resulted entirely from my desire to furnish you with as
full information upon the subject of your inquiry as could
be obtained.
