I am instructed by His Excellency and the Council to inform you that no complaint whatever was made to them against you and that you were left in the Commission of Justice of the Peace for Baltimore City because it was understood by them that you were engaged in business as an Auctioneer, you desired to be re-appointed. I am instructed to say further that had it been known that you wished to continue in the Commission, not the slightest thought of leaving you out would have been entertained by any member of the Executive and that they regret the misapprehension under which they acted. I am directed to add that Governor Martin's personal acquaintance with you and his knowledge of your meritorious character and ample qualifications for the office, make him regret exceedingly that your desire to continue in the Commission was not known to him.
