I immediately upon receiving your letter of the 7th Instant I commenced an examination of the Records of my Office for the appointment of a Bounty of Bayley of which you spoke and after a pretty tedious search have found it. It appears in the proceedings of the Council of the 20th of January 1792 in the following words viz. Mr. Montjoy Bayley is appointed to dispose of the Land, Westward of Fort Cumberland, agreeably to the Supplement of the Act respecting the Soldiers on the reserved Land, Westward of Fort Cumberland.

I have not made an entry in the Record of the appointment, agreeably to your request, because I wish before doing so to have more specific directions, after making you acquainted with the precise state of the fact.
