I have had to remind you that the Council are to meet on Thursday the 15th inst. Mr. Taney's resignation of the Office of Attorney General is received. I fear there will be too much anxiety in favour of several individuals for the Executive to be able to give general satisfaction. I learn that it is expected that the friends of Dr. Dwyer & Co. will warmly propose him, and that those of Mr. Williams & Co. will be warmly engaged. Others, in this more and spoken of, and among them John Boyle of this City, who of course our friends here are in favour of. Mr. Boyle, and Mr. Kern, of the the Eastern side will also be before you for the Office. I have written both, and understand from each, that the appointment would be very acceptable. I think each of them has considerable hopes of success. I enclose you a letter from Mr. Fletcher of Philadelphia, from which you will learn that the three Bonds, issued by the late Governor are finished and ready for delivery.
