Sir, I have your enclosed. Vice Proequi for Denton Young. I should have handed it directly to the Clerk of the County Court here and merely apprised you that it was signed, but for the Governor having mentioned that you wished the process to be drawn up as a Parson and stated that I could refer to, a case in point. I have in recollection of any case where a writ has been issued by the Executive, to arrest a prosecution, that is being in terms, designated as a Parson. If there is, however, any objection <sup>to the</sup> legal effect of a Vice Proequi and a Parson, I think that the Governor may grant either, at his discretion. He directed me in this case (if touching the matter over with the Council) to make out the Vice Proequi, in the usual form. I send the papers to you, that if you still deem it material or desirable to have it in the form of a Parson you may have an opportunity before it goes to the Clerk to request His Excellency to have it put into that form: which I think I can do, without difficulty, if His Excellency shall so direct.
