Annapolis Nov. 25th 1831

Sir, your letter of Sept. last, with three copies of a Revised Code of the Laws of Indiana has been received by His Excellency the Governor Howard.

It is a subject of regret that we are unable, at the present time, to comply with your request, to be furnished with at least one complete set of the Laws of this State. The Executive has not ability disposal of any complete set of our Laws, but your and other similar requests from other States will be submitted to the consideration of the General Assembly at the coming December Session, where no doubt is entertained but that the necessary provision on the subject will be made. Our Laws are now undergoing ~~through~~ revision and digest, and when completed it is expected that the revised Code will supersede the use of all others, and will, doubtless be furnished to all our Sister States.
