Dear Sir,
Yours, the 18th instant, requesting arms to be sent
to send to your self-large Party was received by His Excellency and
laid before the Council at the recent meeting.

The news of insurrection, either commenced or imminent,
the Governor has full and unconditional authority to call the
Militia and under this authority a considerable number of Arms
have been distributed since the recent massacre in Southampton,
Virginia, and alarm in this State. But His Excellency had ceased
for a week or two before the receipt of your letter to issue arms
under this power.

The Governor and Council are authorized to loan
Arms to the Militia upon receiving Bond for their safe keeping
and return, when called for, and I am instructed to inform you,
that the Arms mentioned in your Schedule (except the sword and
pistol of which there are more in the armories) will be furnished
upon compliance with this condition.
