I am instructed by the Governor & Council, to apprise you that charges against your official conduct, have been laid before them this morning in the shape of a return made to the Attorney's Office, of several ~~papers~~ of wood paper by you as follows. Viz. on the 14th of November 1822, of 1/2 cord paper by you for J. Davidson, received by J. Berry, J. Timmony & W. J. Wright reduced to 4 1/2 cords. This notice is given you that you may have the opportunity of making defence against these impeachments of your official conduct, if you should think proper. You having recently been re-appointed and commissioned will not prevent the Executive power exercising the power of removal given by the Constitution; and unless you satisfactorily explain or disprove the charges against you, they will feel it their duty to remove you.
