

a reasonable and fair compensation for their supplies. It cannot be doubted but that the Legislature will take this view of the subject and settle, or direct the settlement of the claims upon equitable and liberal principles. It is regretted that the parties should suffer the inconvenience of having to wait for Legislative action upon their claims; but it is unavoidable.

Yours of the 16th acknowledging the receipt of three copies of the Laws of this State passed at the last Session of the General Assembly and of the 4th Volume of Gill & Simons Reports of decisions in our Court of Appeals is now before me.

The Package to which you refer containing the Reports of decisions in the Court of Appeals of Virginia, was received here on the 29th day of April last, in my absence from the Seat of Government.
