by the Act of 1844 to do away with the exercise of this power.
and to confer upon the Co. the power of extending this
privilege from one to three days - If I am in error in
the views here expressed I shall be glad to be convin-
ced of my error - I shall be pleased to have your views
more fully explained upon the question -

I have been expecting to hear from
you in reference to the bonds of the Collector of the State tax
for Caroline County - In your last letter you say that the Collec-
tor will not consent to serve unless he is allowed ten per cent.

Under the law the commission (as I wrote you) is to be fixed
by the Levy Court. I regret the power is not left with me -

If the Levy Court has not fixed such a commission as will
induce the Collector to serve I wish you to say to him that
I shall expect him to bona & discharge the duty which
I have assigned him & that I will when the Legislature
meets apply to them to authorize a further compensation to him.

Please to give this matter your continued attention
until we have a Collector for your County & the Collector
& yourself will entitle yourselves to the gratitude of
the State, which will be at all times remembered by
