I have received several communications from you in reference to your claim against the State, but as I had communicated to your Brother Mr. Thos. S. Alexander my views upon the subject with the request that he would confer with you I did not suppose a reply necessary. I state to your Brother and now state to you that I cannot pay your claim unless I am furnished with some proof to show that the time necessarily consumed in superintending the copying of the Slave Measure &c is fairly worth the amount charged by you.

Your Brother suggested some plan for estimating the value of your services and promised after talking with you to write me upon the subject in the letters which you have sent to this Department lately that in the opinion of the Writers the superintendence of such work is worth two dollars per day, but are all entirely silent as to the time which should be properly occupied in such superintendance.

The Legislature had no right to impose this duty upon me, but as I have felt sincerely desirous of gratifying you in the matter, I will have great pleasure in paying you such amount as in my own judgment would be right, or in paying the whole Bill, if I can be furnished with evidence of its correctness, which would justify me in public opinion.

Sir,

Captain Mearns stated to me that he would be prepared to offer his men for Muster into the Service of the United States, on Saturday last and he was accordingly ordered to report to you at Washington City on that day.

If any other Company of Volunteers should offer their services, tome before Captain Mearns is ready with his men it should certainly accept them to order them to be received by you.

I send by Mail of this day direct to you at Washington, the Commission for the 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenants in the Company in which Mr. Smith was originally recommended. I await your recommendation of a surgeon.
