I have received your favour of the 18th Inst requesting a Nolle Prosequi to be issued in favour of a Negro Boy accused of Larceny. Do you predicate the application upon the ground that the punishment assigned to the offence is that the party should be sold out of the State & that his Master will sell him if the Nolle Prosequi is granted. You are fully aware that the object of imposing punishment for the commission of crime is designed to prevent the recurrence of the offence, a design which you will see would be defeated by adopting the rule "that a Nolle Prosequi should be issued whenever the Master is willing to sell the slave committing the offence beyond the limits of the State".

I regret that I cannot consistently with my sense of duty gratify you in this matter.
