By the 1st of the last Session Chapl. 461 Sec. 2^d the Commissioners of Lotteries may, with the approbation of the Govr. pay out of money received for stamp on Licenses, such sum as they may deem necessary for the detection & punishment of fraud upon or violation of the Lottery laws. Before the passage of this Act the Commissioners of Lotteries were required to prosecute all offences against the various Lottery laws, but no provision whatever was made, or so far as I can, can authority given for the payment of any costs or other expenses growing out of these prosecutions. These expenses have heretofore been very heavy & have been paid out of money raised for the several grants & the total sum which has been collected - funds upon the system affecting not only the grants but the revenue of the State, are every day deposited in this city by the sale of lottery tickets with negroes by negroes who are agents for white men & by white men themselves. The law directs Police Officers to engage in the detection of these offenders, relying for their compensation solely upon the sum of fees allowed them by the law; for surely nine hundred of those who are engaged in this business are unable to pay the fees if convicted. Hence the necessity of making some contract with the Police assuring to them a fair compensation for such services as they may render.

If you will see in Baltimore shortly any action in the premises may be postponed until I can confer personally with you on the subject, if not I hope you will authorize the Commissioners to make contract as they may deem necessary to arrest these proceedings.
