The Governor has received a petition from citizens of Talbot County, stating that Theodore Lockett & Co. Lockett, charged with an attempt with intent to commit a murder, has removed his trial to Talbot County; that he has employed able counsel, and mandates that the public interests require the employment of additional counsel to act in conjunction with the States Attorney, for that County. After due consideration, the Governor has resolved to grant the application, as it appears to him to be well grounded and proper. You are therefore assigned as counsel to aid the States Attorney of Talbot County, in the prosecution of Theodore R. Lockett, in the case aforesaid.

You will please signify me immediately of your acceptance or refusal of this appointment.

The Governor hopes that you may feel at liberty to accept the position, although it is a disagreeable one; in the ends of public justice should be suberved, even at the cost of individual feeling. The Governor will feel secure in entrusting the public interests to your energy, talents and professional experience.
