

of many months, and a visit to Mexico for the purpose of investigating it, would render a resignation of its duties, a subject of much self reproach to me, if not for censure by others. Therefore ask you & all, why should these circumstances be allowed to interfere with my public employment in the cause against Secession.

I could I think it at all probable that I cannot tend to the prosecution of this case, & a speedy one, & should be induced to do so with great and little difficulty. Second & whilst in the action of the Legislature of our State, touching this case, would only serve to strengthen my devotion to the demands of public justice.

It would give me additional stimulus to my efforts, to know that I could be in a situation to maintain the right public interests and private purposes, which have governed your actions in this case, and which have been rightly and justly aspaied.

Whatever perfect I may find in leaving so responsible a duty to my State, and which you so kindly be stoned charge, without any solicitation or expectation on my part, not only to gratify the demands of those good citizens, who feel anxious for the administration of Justice will be followed by the knowledge, that another will call himself to discharge this service can easily be found among the members of the Bar of the State.
