Sir:

Not until the 14th of this month, did I know that a com-
plaint had been made to your Excellency by Messrs A. Gugg
Flee against most of the Inspectors of Liquors in the City of Balt-
more tho' designating but one.

On the receipt of your Communication I in Company
with Mr. A. Cummings called on Mr. Gugg, who said frankly
he had no Cause of Complaint against either of us. - I then
demanded as a simple act of Justice to us, that he should
name the parties offending to your Excellency, which he re-
fused to do - saying he was in a passion when he wrote to you
and did not wish further action on it - Now for myself,
I defy Mr. G. or any other Merchant in this City to say, that
since I had the honor to receive the appointment from you
Casks of Liquor have ever laid on the pavement two
hours after they have left their names for the Inspector
on the District where I was on duty, (except on Pearl Wharf
where frequently large Cargoes are received and even in
that case not over twelve hours -

If necessary, we can give Certificates to that
effect, from all the Dealers.

Mr. A. G. complains of one Ganger attending to
two districts, and that therefore he must neglect his duty.
The two districts to which he alludes have never more
than 125 bbls. per week - I do not average 75, which any
ganger could inspect in less than three hours - So that
no ganger need neglect Mr. Gugg by attending to these
two districts.

There are as Mr. G. observes five districts and seven
gangers, but instead of walking about in idleness as
charged we are compelled to assist each other, - by fre-
quently the time we are off duty spent most laborously of-
fending those on the wharf districts where there is often more
than one can possibly do.
