Should you imagine that as I trust they may, in satisfying the public mind, that there are no such secret political combinations, or that no oaths, obligations, or pledges are administered in such Councils, to the prejudice to any class of American Citizens, & that this does not rest my honor or suffice in such Societies to "trouble trouble or discomfertance," or to exclude from their employ, or affect any Citizen in Consequence of, the religion or principles, or the place of his habitation. The one will be more pleasing than myself & more than ready to acknowledge that injustice has been done, & to a man of any people. Of course, the few reduced before the Committee shall evidently establish that Secret Political Councils have been organized among us for the purpose of impressing obnoxious to them, I humbly conceive that there can be little or no diversity of opinion as to their tendency to subvert "the well established & dearly cherished principles of our Government." The Constitution degrades no man, either on account of his place of birth, or his religious opinions, but equally covers every Citizen of the State, & whatever birth, or whatever born, with its protecting shield. And if it shall be made to appear that in such of these political Councils as may be known to exist, oaths or pledges are administered for the purpose of qualifying & obstructing the exercise of the right of suffrage, in Amendment unknown to, or unwarranted by the Constitution, it will be for you to give your judgment, to determine when such obligations shall be allowed to conflict with the Constitutional obligations of the Citizen to the State & to apply the remedy which such a condition of things may require.

It might be well to consider, that while this matter is undergoing investigation, whether the existence of such a secret order that may have led in some instances to pre-determined obstruction of the polls, resulting in violence & disorder & the exclusion of the legal voters of orderly & well disposed citizens; for it is one of the most imperative duties of the State to turn around electors of every class, whether Native or adopted, any possible means of protection against any & all combinations secret or open, that would hinder, or scare away them, on the exercise of their right of voting, & thus impede the free course of the only legitimate means of obtaining an expression of the public mind. Unjust & deliberate obstruction of the polls is a crime against the State, & much in view of the consequences, abhors a degree of unrighteousness to which it is difficult to assign a limit, & the Legislature can scarcely be too rigid in the infliction of punishment upon those who may be found guilty of such an offence against the dignity of the State & the right of the individual citizen. It should at least be declared a felony and punished accordingly. I hope, whatever may be the result of your present investigation, that you command such action of the favorable Police, or the Legislature, in order that henceforth any hindrance or obstruction whatsoever with intent to prevent a voter from depositing his ballot shall be punished with due severity.
